BIOS OF PRESENTERS

Professor Trevor Munroe

Topic: Ethics and Political Funding



Since 2011, Professor Trevor Munroe, one of the Caribbean's leading public scholars, has been Executive Director of Jamaica's National Integrity Action Limited, a not for profit NGO dedicated to the building of integrity and the combat of corruption in Jamaica on a non-partisan basis. Prior to this he directed the National Integrity Action Forum a coalition of leaders of public sector anti-corruption agencies, a 2-year project launched in 2009 and supported by USAID. In 2012, Professor Munroe was appointed an individual member of Transparency International, the only such person from the Caribbean, one among 27 in the world.

As a scholar, he was promoted to Professor of Government and Politics at the UWI in 1998 and appointed founding Director of the Centre for Leadership and Governance in 2006. He had previously served as Head of the Mona Campus' Department of Government.

Professor Munroe is the author or co-author of eight (8) books primarily on issues of Caribbean democratic governance. His 1972 book on Jamaican politics remains the authoritative work on Jamaica's transition to Independence. He has written extensively on issues of corruption and governance, including authoring Transparency International's National Integrity System country studies of Jamaica, the Caribbean and, most recently, the Turks and Caicos Islands.

Professor Munroe, a Jamaican Rhodes Scholar, who attained his doctorate at Oxford University, after 1st class honours degree at UWI, has received many academic awards, including the UWI Vice Chancellor's Award for Excellence, The Mona Campus Principal's Award for Research, the Honorary

Doctorate in Social Sciences from Florida International University THE FIRST FROM THE English-speaking Caribbean and taken up Fulbright Fellowships at Harvard University in the United States.

Dr. Grace Virtue

Topic: Media Highlights: Competition, Ethics and Marketing



Dr. Grace Virtue is a communication scholar and practitioner, based in Washington D.C. Dr. Virtue is the Garvey Centenary Scholar, a former Rotary ambassadorial Scholar and fellow of the Inter-American Press Association. She holds a doctorate in mass communication (with a cognate in political science) and a Master's Degree from Howard University, Washington D.C. She earned her Bachelor's degree in journalism and social science from the University of the West Indies, Mona.

Dr. Virtue has presented on various topics at Howard University; the University of Miami, Coral Gables, Fla; The George Washington University, Washington, D.C; Rutgers University; the University of the Cayman Islands, as well as various civic organizations in Washington D.C. and Maryland. In 2012, delivered the 2nd annual public lecture CARIMAC (West campus) speaking on the topic: The Today Show, Usain Bolt, Slum Dog Millionaire: The Caribbean Media and the Crisis of Globalization.

Her rich experience as a cross-cultural academic and a media practitioner gives her an exceptionally strong voice in the industry on topics such as globalization and intercultural communication.

Professor Paul Miller

Topic: Postmodernity and School Leadership: Whither Ethical Practices?



Professor Paul Miller, PhD, joined Brunel University in January 2014 as a Reader in Education where he is also Programme Leader for MA Education. Professor Miller has good experience working in Higher Education and prior to joining Brunel, he was Professor of Educational Leadership & Management and Programme Leader & Convenor of the MEd/PhD programmes in Educational Leadership & Management at the University of Technology, Jamaica, (UTech). Before going to UTech, he was Senior Lecturer in Education/Early Childhood Studies at Middlesex University where he was also Programme Leader & Convenor of the MA (Leadership, Management & Change) and EdD. He is Board Member of the Institute for Educational Administration & Leadership- Jamaica (IEAL-J), a member of Council of the Commonwealth Council for Educational Administration & Management (CCEAM), Fellow of the College of Teachers and Fellow of the Institute for Fiscal Studies.

Professor Miller has given keynote and other conference presentations and written widely on issues in School Leadership. He is editor of the book, *School Leadership in the Caribbean: Perceptions, Practices, Paradigms* (Symposium Books, 2013).

Professor Terry Morehead Dworkin

Topic: Whistleblowing and the Workplace: Government and Private Sector Practices



Professor Terry Morehead Dworkin, JD, is Scholar in Residence at Seattle University School of Law; the Jack R. Wentworth Emerita Professor, Kelley School of Business; former Dean of the Office of Women's Affairs at Indiana University; and Co-Director of the Center for International Business Education and Research at IU.

She has coauthored two books on whistleblowing, and she has convened many international scholarly conferences on whistleblowing. She holds a B.A. from Stanford University and a J.D. from Indiana University.

Professor William P. Schonberg

Topic: Ethics in Engineering



Professor William Schonberg has over 25 years teaching and research experience in the areas of shock physics, spacecraft protection, hypervelocity impact, and penetration mechanics. The results of Dr. Schonberg's research have been applied to a wide variety of engineering problems, including the development of orbital debris protection systems

for spacecraft in low earth orbit, collapse of buildings under explosive loads, and aging aircraft. His research is unique in that it considers a number of significant parameters typically omitted in the analysis and design of damage-resistant spacecraft, and as such, has results in numerous spacecraft design improvements. Dr. Schonberg's international reputation has been earned primarily through the publication of refereed journal articles – to date he has published over 65 papers in refereed journals on these topics, and has presented over 60 papers at a broad spectrum of international scientific and professional meetings, including several invited papers. Dr. Schonberg has also received over 35 contracts and grants from a variety of federal, state, local, and private funding agencies.

Professor Lloyd Waller

Topic: Corruption Monitoring and Evaluation



Dr. Lloyd Waller is a Professor in methodology at the University of the West Indies, Mona, Jamaica, He holds a Doctor of Philosophy in Sociology and Social Policy from the University of Waikato, New Zealand, with a specialization in Information and Communication for Development and Advanced Research Methods.

Dr. Waller specializes in the development, advancement and use of relevant research methodologies, methods and analytical tools to integrate technology, business, government and society for the purpose of development.

His primary areas of research are advanced research methodologies, and development studies, with a special emphasis on corruption, electronic governance, and information and communication technologies in foreign trade and development.

His secondary areas of research include project management, small business entrepreneurship, and strategic management.

Dr. Waller is the Strategic Polling and Survey Manager in the Research Unit of the Centre for Leadership and Governance as well as the Logistic Survey Manager for the Boxill Polls. His most recent book is *The Role of Discourse in ICT for Development: Lessons from Jamaica*.
